Choices reveal what kind of person we are and by our choices determines what kind of person we are and will become. 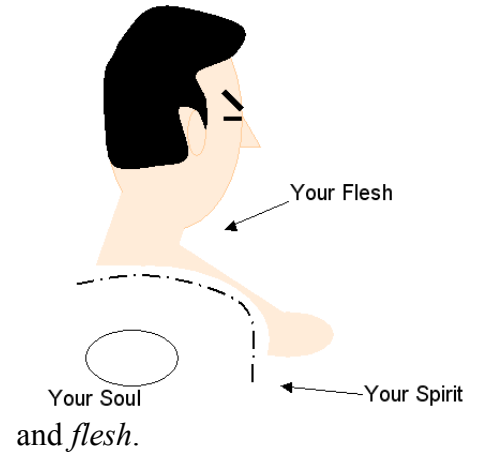
I thought it would be good to begin this article on finances with a small preface and introduction. I would like all who read this to catch the vision and purpose of it's content, which is to awaken your conscience to the *greatness* and *potential* resident within **every** human being. In recent years I have had the privilege to counsel families about the spiri-

tual and financial aspects of their lives. I have found that though many possess the insight of what is needed to be done to maximize their lives (whether spiritual or financial), very few commit themselves to the consistent implementation of the proven methods given to reach the goal they envision from the word of God. They see the promise land, but the task ahead becomes too great or takes too long; kinda like Israel in **Numbers chapter 13**.

The Bible has concluded (**Lu.16:1-12; Col.1:25-29**) that *riches* can be either spiritual or material. Each have a similar law for attaining one or both simultaneously. To increase spiritually or materially, one must labor (**Col.1:29**). Paul said that he had to labor to the intent that he might extract the riches of Christ which lay dormant and resident among the Gentiles (**Col.1:27**), which riches once released and properly placed would produce the reality of God's vision . . . every child of God perfect (in the Greek: *teleios*.. or mature) in Christ (**Col.1:28**). How you govern those extensions declare your level of commitment to God's kingdom. There must be full commitment in all: Soul, Spirit, and Flesh. Remember, three is perfection. You have also been given two other extensions of your soul which also declare your commitment to God's kingdom.

Along with your *body*, your *time* and your *finance* are a direct link to your level of dedication to accomplishing God's purpose in the



Earth. Okay, I believe by now you see the connection between the spiritual and the material.

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# TIME MANAGEMENT



*If time be of all things the most precious, wasting time must be the greatest prodigality. - Ben Franklin*

In Luke Chapter 19, Christ tells a parable that relates our responsibility to God to make use of the things that He gives us. We will be called to accountability for the way we handle not only our finances, but also our talents, our relationships, our time and anything else God gives us. In this article, however, I just want to speak on time.

Though not a "seasoned investor" in time, I have made a few great steps toward investing my time more wisely and I would like to share with you the system I used to get me using my time more efficiently. After this article, maybe we can bring in someone who can take us into deeper principles of time management. The system I will be sharing with you is called the "Time Quadrant" system and was designed by Franklin Covey - a

well known author of books that help people to improve their lifestyles by giving them tips to make them more efficient and organized.

There are four quadrants (as pictured at the bottom). We will begin with Quadrant #4 and work our way to Quadrant #1.

## Quadrant # 4

Ever spent a lot of time doing things that are neither important or urgent, perhaps an hour, an evening, or even a day? What did you feel like at the end of it? You probably felt a little empty, the kind of feeling when you waste money on something you later realize you had no need of getting. It is that dull feeling that is associated with all types of waste.



I find it amazing how often we spend our time doing things that are neither urgent nor important. It is so easy to slip into watching movies excessively or reading to much and neglecting those things that are really needing to be done.

While chatting over the internet, phone calls, shopping, relaxation and social occasions are all part of a balanced lifestyle, any of these things done to excess can quickly lead spending time in Q 4.

Spending time in Q 4 can quickly become a habit, simply because you do not have to work at it - those types of habits are the easiest to pick up. Spending one hour doing nothing can turn into a day, into a week, into a lifestyle of doing nothing. Once that happens, you are on track to living a life that means nothing. That is not healthy and it is not Christian - we are called to live meaningful lives and make the best that we can out of the little time we are given.

In conclusion to Quadrant 4, let us just go over some of what an investment in Q 4 reaps: Lack of responsibility, shallow lifestyle, and guilt. If you recognize yourself as being in this position, you need to read on.

In this article we'll touch on Legacy, Resources, and Objectives.

**Our Objective**

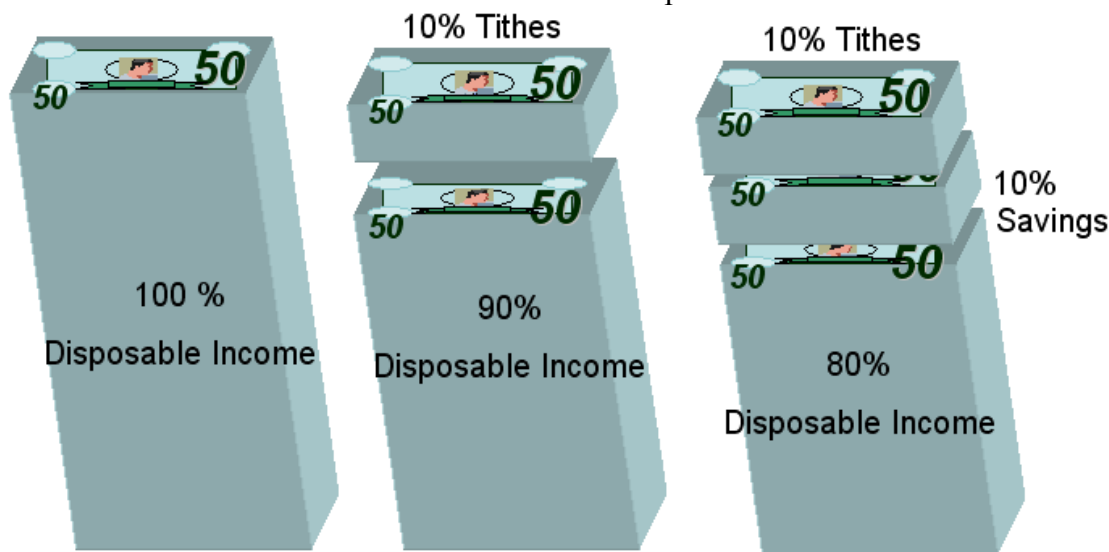

**False Views of Financial Legacy**

Most Christians have been led or taught to believe that being poor is spiritual, these scriptures speak to the contrary: **Deut. 28:1-14, Ecc.5:18-20**. Also there is a time and a season for every purpose under heaven. I have heard over and over about paying tithes, but what should a christian do with the other 90% ?

Let's watch what I call the 20/80 Rule: 3 examples in the graph below with a yearly salary of \$ 20,000.00

After being a christian from age 18 - 28, who has accomplished Gen.1:28? Who can

go and be a blessing to others while still providing for their family? Who can help send someone to the foreign fields to preach the gospel? Who can help with the new church that needs to be built? You add the other questions.

A lot of Christians were poor when the gospel met them. They only remain poor because of warped views of money, lack of ambition and/or opportunity, lack of knowledge and discipline (Psa.49:20). It is sad to say that in some cases, if not a lot of times, these warped views and lack of *this* or *that* is the Legacy left them by their natural and/or spiritual parents and mentors.

What if we applied the 20/80 Rule not only to our finances, but to our time - 2hrs and 40minutes a day to God. 2hrs and 40minutes to self improvement - which could be learning how to get out and stay out of debt, or perfecting your gifts and talents, or how to turn your talent or hobby into a service, or family devotions and altar time. The applications could be endless. It's benefits unimaginable.

This 20/80 Rule is just the tip of the ice cream-berg when it comes to finances. But as I said in the introduction: though many have grasped the insight of what is needed to improve their lives (spiritually or financially) very, very few commit themselves to the consistent implementation in order to reach their goals and objectives.

What Legacy will you leave behind? What resources do you have? Are you meeting God's vision for your life... for your community?

Only you can answer . . .

### **Quadrant # 3**

The character of someone who spends a lot of their time in Q 3 is one that gives in. They easily sacrifice their time to please others and avoid conflict. While some may quote Brother Branham as saying, "A Christian life is living for others" in defense of this sort of lifestyle, I am inclined to disagree. If you give in to every person who comes along and asks for your time or wants you to "hang out" with them, you will have little or no time to do those things which drive you forward into a position to really being able to help others, not just please them.

Living a life driven to please people is not balanced and is a downward spiral in that one quickly gains the reputation of being a pleaser and will find more people demanding for their time and less and less time for themselves and their goals. There are times for spending with others and building relationships, yes. However, these times need to be designated and when designated and time controlled, they fall under Quadrant 2 - more about that later.

So what's the cure for someone living in Q 3? Focus. Same cure for someone trapped in Q 4, in case you were wondering. Focus on what? Focus on Q 2.

### **Quadrant # 2**

Quadrant 2 is the cure for a lifestyle based on Q's 3 & 4. Someone who spends most of their time in Q 2 is a prioritizer. They

recognize and meet the need from a distance, before it gets urgent.

Time spent in Q 2 is filled with important things like activities, relationship building & spending time with others, planning, schoolwork, projects, etc. Are these things urgent? No, but they are important and need tending to.

Living life in Q 2 avoids stress by planning ahead and accomplishing those things that need to be done before they develop into a hectic deadline. Someone living here basically has a handle on this, knows that their priorities are and follows accordingly. They see something a far off and are prepared before it arrives.

Sounds good, huh? I believe this is the way we are supposed to live. I do not believe that God wants to see a bunch of people loafing about doing nothing - and neither does He want to see His people running around like a bunch of chickens with their heads cut off, rushing about because they are not ready. He wants people to be prepared, prepared for that test, prepared for the job interview, prepared to witness and prepared for His Coming.

### **Quadrant # 1**

If Q 2 is the cure for Q's 3 & 4 then Q 1 is the result of them. A rush-rush atmosphere characterizes Q 1. People who live here often get addicted to the emergency like lifestyle they lead and are hard convinced to come of it. Usually, time spent in Q 1 is brought on by neglect. Neglect of schoolwork, so now the person has to cram. Neglect of a relationship and now they have to



do a "patch job."

As Christians, we should not have to spend much time in this quadrant because we should not be doing those things that lead to it. Christians are called to till the soil, not neglect it and then quickly till and plant. Does a farmer wait till harvest to put in His crops because he is too busy going to social gatherings before the winter? I thought not. If we expect to reap a full harvest in our lives, we cannot make a habit of "patch jobs" and "cramming."

There are times when we have to devote time to emergency situations that are totally out of our control, like our car breaking down or a family member falling ill. However, time spent in this quadrant will and should be cut to a minimum by devoting more time in Q 2. Too much time here and we will experience burnout, stress and will not really be reaping all that we should be able to in our personal lives.

OK, Before we end this article, let me give you a few tips that I have learned that may help you to begin shifting your time more towards Q 2.

#### Use A Planner:

Even though you may think a planner is a big hassle and waste of time, you will find that it really helps you to keep on track and see your progress. By entering everything that you need to do that day at the beginning of the day, it creates a forward mindset, bent towards accomplishment. I find it also helps in that I can look back on the day, see what things I did and did not get

done and figure out why. I can then go on my way, resolved to do better the next day.

#### Plan Weekly:

Try taking a few minutes out at the beginning of each week to plan it out and identify what you really need to get done. Why weekly? Because we tend to think in weeks, monthly is too vast and daily is too short.

First off, identify the main things you need to accomplish that week and set aside the time to do it. Make sure that there will be nothing to interrupt you during that time. After that, just move on to the smaller things like household chores, exercising, and spending time with people and most importantly, God. Make sure you leave some time for things that just naturally pop-up throughout the week.

All right, that should do it. Like I said, I am no professional when it comes to time management, but I am finding myself reaping a much fuller harvest with my time by using this system. I believe that you will find yourself reaping more with your time if you just commit to using the principles of this system.
